5. What about mentoring excites you most?

If applicable, some of their likes and dislikes and what books/creative people or art form make them tick.

13. Any tips/advice for applicants to make their applications and/or manuscripts shine?

Edit your work a few times before showing or sharing, write notes if you're struggling with some parts, and keep it simple.

14. What advice or inspiring and/or motivational words would you like to offer up to anyone applying to be your mentee or simply reading this questionnaire?

Take all advice as ingredients to your own unique creation and not as instructions. Put them all in a pot and see what you get.
