People who are defensive when they receive feedback; people who write humorous, quirky picture books – I wish I was funny, but I'm just not.

10. How will you help your mentee and their stories develop?

Critiquing manuscripts through feedback and revision cycles, developing story ideas/brainstorming new ideas. I see myself as a critique partner

11. What is your style of communication like?

I am most communicative through email or text and am typically pretty responsive to both. I'd like to meet a few times virtually to discuss mentee manuscripts and feedback/revisions.

12. What are you looking for in the applications you receive?

I'd like to work with someone who is dedicated to the craft and committed to the process of constant revision and iteration. Someone who feels a strong purpose in pursing this art and has a learning mindset. I want to be moved by stories!

Tell the story of your heart, not the story you think someone wants to hear or that you think needs to be on bookshelves.
